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INTRODUCTION

Putnam County initiated a strategic planning process on November 5, 2019 with a community visioning workshop in Crescent City. Ms. Marilyn Crotty, consultant from the Florida Institute of Government at the University of Central Florida, designed and facilitated the process.

Putnam County residents, businesses, organizations, and other stakeholders were invited to attend any of three workshops that were held in various locations to share their hopes and dreams for the future of the county. Approximately 50 people attended the first session. The second workshop, held in Palatka had 30 people in attendance, and 20 people participated in the final session in Interlachen.

The attendees were assigned to small groups in which they responded to questions posed by the facilitator. This report is a summary of the ideas that were generated with special attention to the emerging consensus on issues that was apparent at each of the workshops.

This information will be shared with the County Commission prior to their strategic planning session on December 16-17, 2019 and will provide community input to the goals, objectives, and priorities that the Commission establishes for the county.

While the participants in this workshop shared many of the same treasures and values that had been identified in the first session, there was more of an emphasis placed on the provision of social services in the desired future described by many than had been heard before. During the closing comments several people urged the County to work in a collaborative manner with the municipalities, the private, and the nonprofit sectors to address countywide issues. Once again, the attendees were appreciative of the opportunity to have input into the strategic planning process and hoped it will have an impact on the future of the County.

THIRD COMMUNITY VISIONING WORKSHOP

NOVEMBER 21, 2019

The third in this series of community workshops was held on November 21st in Interlachen. Approximately 20 people participated in this session using the same format and agenda that had been used in the previous workshops. Ms. Crotty again served as the facilitator.

While this workshop had the fewest number of attendees, the participants enthusiastically discussed the issues that are of importance to them. This was the only session that had a teenager participating, thus specific issues about school programs were identified. Like the other two workshops, the attendees listed many of the same treasures and values. Their priorities for the future were also in line with those from the first two sessions. Participants expressed a hope that the county will share the results of these workshops with the municipalities.

CONCLUSIONS

The community visioning workshops were fairly well attended (approximately 100 people) with a mix of participants. The diversity of the county was reflected in various dimensions: ethnicity, race, length of residency, etc. Because the sessions were held in different parts of the county, the specific interests of the South County, versus Palatka, versus Interlachen were clearly articulated. However, one common characteristic was evident and that was the love the residents of Putnam County have for the county and their optimism to see it continue as a wonderful place to live in the future.

There was no shortage of ideas generated and as the County Commission plans for the future, it is important that the Commission keeps in mind the identified treasures and values that the residents would like to see continued or improved upon. There was broad agreement upon the following:

- The natural environment including the river, trails, forests, and open space;
- The small town, rural nature of the county;
- The rich history of the area reflected in its homes, buildings, and heritage;

- Economic development efforts that have been made especially support of small businesses:
- Arts and culture.

Numerous suggestions were made for projects and programs to be initiated that will create the desired future for the county. There was a high degree of consensus on what that should consist of. The following issues were supported by most of the people in attendance at the workshops:

- Clean, well maintained natural and physical environment;
- Provision of quality health care and social services;
- Economic development that focuses on jobs, ecotourism, increased shopping and entertainment options;
- Improved education at all levels and an emphasis on the provision of vocational and technical training;
- Government services that provide improved infrastructure, public safety, and transportation alternatives;
- Controlled growth to maintain the quality of life as a rural community

While some of the suggestions for services and improvements are not the responsibility of the county, there was a hope that the county will take the lead in encouraging cooperation and collaboration among all sectors of the community to achieve positive results.

Putnam County is poised to embrace a future that maintains the qualities that have drawn people to the community in the past and that will ensure it is a county that provides new opportunities for the people who choose to call this home.
